AMERICAN CLASSICS

Despite composing in a radically experimental style even before Schoenberg, Berg and Webern had formulated their ideas on atonality, Ives saw himself as the 'continuing spirit' in the tradition of Beethoven. His *Second Symphony*, written between 1902 and 1910, but not premiered until 1951, is one of the most 'American' and accessible of symphonies, drawing on patriotic marches, Stephen Foster tunes, a college song and revival hymns for much of its thematic material. By contrast, the *Robert Browning Overture* is as challenging a work as some of the poems of the writer that it celebrates.
