



The music of John Joubert – born in 1927 in Cape Town, a student at the Royal Academy of Music in London in the 1940s and '50s, and Birmingham-based since 1962 – has a strong sense of melody, his beguiling lyricism combining with an acute sensitivity to words to produce songs that are both colourful and evocative. His chamber works, drawing on a rich instrumental palette and haunting melodic lines, are memorable and dramatically effective.
