## AMERICAN CLASSICS

Conductor, composer, educator. pianist: Leonard Bernstein without question, the greatest musician America has ever produced. Bernstein described his Serenade, inspired by Plato's Symposium, as a "series of related statements in praise of love" and considered it his "most satisfying" work. Of particular note is the slow lyrical melody in the first movement, Phaedrus, soon to be immortalised in Maria from West Side Story (Naxos 8.559126).
