Meyerbeer was a precocious composer and this album traces some of his very earliest works. Der Fischer und das Milchmädehen was his first stage work, a charming rural vignette that contains all the essential features of a ballet-divertissement couched in writing that enchantingly evokes the 18th century. Collaborating with his teacher, the Abbé Georg Vogler, Meyerbeer composed Der Admiral in 1811. The following year saw Wirt und Gast with the vivid Oriental exoticism of its Janissary music, while Romilda e Constanza, his first Italian opera, shows his complete assimilation of Rossinian models.
